

MISSISSIPPI STATE – Despite low prices for many commodities, the overall projected totals for Mississippi's crop values should top \$7 billion for the third straight year and essentially match the record set in 2013. John Michael Riley, agricultural economist with the Mississippi State University Extension Service, said his preliminary estimate of 2014's agricultural production values, excluding government payments, is over \$7.7 billion. promising.

"Mississippi producers dropped from 830,000 to 520,000 harvested acres of corn and saw about a \$1.73 drop per bushel in price. With a current projected price of \$3.62 per bushel, it's the lowest price we've seen since 2006." Riley said the 55.3 percent drop in corn from 2013's values was more of an issue of lower acres than lower prices, but both combined for corn to have its lowest overall value since 2009, at \$349.6 million. The projected yield of 186 bushels per acre, if realized, would be an all-time high.

"The row crops sector of the agricultural economy took a bit of hit, but there were pockets of that sector that saw improvements, such as cotton and rice," Riley said. "On the bright side, the livestock sector is doing well with all three segments of that industry -- beef cattle, dairy cattle and hogs -- showing double-digit improvements. percentage wise, from the previous year."

Using the Estrus Synchronization Planner

The Estrus Synchronization Planner has been available since 1998, developed by the lowa Beef Center. It has evolved over the years, proving to be an effective and easy tool to help select and implement synchronization protocols. The program is available as a free excel spreadsheet download or as a mobile version. Both include the protocols recommended by the Beef Reproduction Task Force.

The excel spreadsheet can downloaded from the Iowa Beef Center or visit the Applied Reproductive Strategies in Beef Cattle website (http://beefrepro.unl.edu/). To download this version, the computer must have excel for the program to function.

The mobile version can be downloaded on the EstruSync website. (http:// estrussynch.com/) It will contain the critical features to function but will not be identical to the full excel spreadsheet version. A wireless or internet connection is required and may limit the use in pastures depending on cellular coverage.

Features include creating a synchronization and breeding calendar with exact dates and times when hormones should be given and/ or removed, when heat detection should occur and breeding. Timing is critical for a successful program. It allows for a cost comparison between protocol systems and a cost response analysis.


Latest inventory figures show cow herd expansion is underway

This year's USDA Cattle Inventory report was especially significant – it revealed that U.S. beef producers have seemingly turned the corner and are now committed torebuilding the cow herd over the next several years. Moreover, 2015's beef cow inventory was even larger than expected; this year's cowherd is more than 600,000 head larger than last year. The growth is the first time producers have built the herd since 2005 and 2006; those two years combined saw an increase of only about 170,000 head.

The accompanying chart breaks down 2015's beef cow inventory on a state-bystate level for the top 25 states. Cumulatively, these states represent approximately 90% of the nation's beef cow inventory. Texas and Oklahoma beef cow inventories increased by 270,000 and 105,000 cows, respectively, which accounts for nearly two-thirds of the nation's growth. Note, too, that both Oklahoma and Iowa jumped two spots in the overall ranking.
